## **Field Trip: Magee Marsh**

ur field trip to Magee Marsh on May 3 was a success on several levels. The weather cooperated to keep the birders few in number, in spite of the date which fell at the peak of the migration season. Rain threatened and a gentle version arrived midway in the morning. The number of migrating birds was modest relative to that often found during the first week of May, but I found it relatively easy to study the behavior of the birds present without the distraction of more individuals. Perhaps I have a personal weakness to be diverted by too many birds and too many birdwatchers.

Our list of warblers included Northern Parula, Yellow Warbler, Chestnut-sided Warbler, Magnolia Warbler, Black-throated Green Warbler, Palm Warbler, Black-and-white Warbler, American Redstart, Ovenbird, Northern Waterthrush, Common Yellowthroat, Hooded

Warbler, and Yellow-breasted Chat.

Among the likely kinglets, gnatcatcher, and thrushes were Ruby-crowned Kinglet, Blue-gray Gnatcatcher, Veery, Graycheeked Thrush, Swainson's Thrush, Hermit Thrush, Wood Thrush, and American Robin.
